

## COUNCIL/EXECUTIVE

### **Core Review Task Force**

ver the past year, Council authorized the formation of a Core Review Task Force (CRTF) with the aggressive goals of implementing a Core Review process for the Association. Members were selected broadly to encompass key stakeholders and included representation from APEGBC staff, Council and ASTTBC.

The CRTF grappled with long-

standing issues associated with the current membership and tried to anticipate issues associated with a potential merger with ASTTBC. With a potential 30% membership increase in a postmerger environment, it was important for the CRTF to investigate current member-related issues and the delivery of essential services under the *Engineers and Geoscientists Act*, and to identify key areas for improvement.

Council had approved a sum of \$85,000 to obtain the necessary external guidance and support to complete the review; however, it became apparent that the most appropriate expertise would come from within. Thus all CRTF deliverables were defined and delivered using existing human resources with minimal cost to APEGBC.

The CRTF identified the following key elements for consideration:

- Governance Model Assessment. APEGBC has never
  had its governance policy formally defined and committed to writing. Council's role as a policy directive
  body, as opposed to one randomly involved in operations, led to less than optimal utilization of human
  and financial resources. The CRTF recommended that
  a Governance Task Force be established to assist
  Council to develop a governance model that will be
  more proactive, business oriented and accountable.
- Committee Restructuring. The current committee structure has long been held to be unwieldy and inefficient. Given the enormous amount of staff time and resources devoted to committee business, a streamlined committee structure and policy for committee and volunteer contributions is required. A process for assessing commitments and/or committees is necessary to position the Association to meet its many obligations. These obligations will be balanced with maximizing member service opportunities and increased responsiveness to member needs while ensuring the long-term financial viability of the Association.
- Member Relevance. This has been a contentious issue in recent years. Because of the diversity of

broad membership, prioritizing opportunities has proven difficult, leading to simply increasing the load on staff and volunteers without due consideration for and focus on Association objectives. A streamlined governance model considers the benefits and risks associated with any new function so that operational parameters can be developed and implemented. Benchmarking demonstrates to the membership where Association resources are utilized, promoting specific member engagement in Association affairs.

The result will be a more transparent response to non-Act issues ranging from emerging disciplines to promotion of the professions to improved integration of geoscience considerations and continuous development. This will tie the Association's values, mission and vision to the evolutionary requirements of all members, laying the groundwork for a process of continuous improvement.

### **Achievements**

- The CRTF has been successful in reviewing the governance model for the Association. A Policy Governance model was proposed by this group that is being comprehensively developed by the Governance Task Force. This model looks at Council and organizational priorities, allowing for enhanced flexibility and predictive capability, ensuring greater stability and better use of Association resources.
- The CRTF reviewed the organizational model (including the committee structure) for the Association and has proposed a structure that is currently being discussed and will be considered by Council irrespective of the merger status. The next step will be to propose completion of an operational review to identify reforms and improvements to Association core business components as defined by the Act (discipline and registration).
- All of this was accomplished without using the \$85,000 budget approved by Council.

To reduce the potential for duplication of tasks, I will be formally recommending that Council disband the CRTF.

I would like to extend my thanks to the Task Force members for the energy, creativity and dedication they brought to bear on the numerous complex issues under consideration. Its success would not have been possible without the dedication and professionalism of all concerned.

### **Governance Task Force**

since 1920, professional engineers have been granted the sole right and responsibility to practise engineering in the province of British Columbia. As part of a self-regulating professional Association, APEGBC members elect a Council to provide overall governance: strategy, direction and oversight as well as fiduciary responsibility. Council, in turn, employs an

Executive Director and staff to manage the operations of the Association.

Under this self-regulating authority, APEGBC sets and maintains the standards of entry and professional practice expected of BC's over 20,000 professional engineers and professional geoscientists, and ensures that only qualified individuals obtain the right to use the designations PEng and PGeo in BC.

Council struck a Governance Task Force to review and recommend the standards, policies and committee structure necessary to provide effective governance for APEGBC. The Task Force expects to complete its task for implementation following the 2004 AGM.

Good governance sets the foundation for a well-run organization that manages its resources properly and is responsible and accountable to both the general public and the membership. Council must implement effective governance and oversight capabilities and practices to set the appropriate framework for management to operate the Association (ie, governing without managing).

Effective governance means that Council must look at the right information and ask the right questions. Council must look to the future, constructively develop strategy and assess management's actions. A Councillor's greatest asset is the independence that allows him or her to evaluate the Association's performance from an objective perspective.

## **Merger Implementation Task Force**

he Merger Implementation Task Force (MITF) is a successor to the former Joint APEGBC/ASTTBC Merger Task Force. It was established by Council following the solid endorsement by members of both Associations to proceed with the merging of ASTTBC into APEGBC.

The mandate given to the MITF was to provide oversight monitoring and high-level advice to sen-

ior staff of both organizations as we collectively proceeded with due diligence, negotiation of a formal Heads of Agreement, development of practice guidelines and drafting of requisite enabling legislation in conjunction with APEGBC's new *Act*.

At the time of the MITF's formation, the scheduled target for implementation was January 1, 2005. By March 2004 it became evident that this date would be deferred by at least a year for several reasons including:

- The Province deferred introduction of APEGBC's new Act to the 2005 legislative session.
- Passage of the new College of Applied Biology Act in November 2002 raised new questions as to whether potential scopes of practice were inferred with rights of title. (The Biologists Act, unlike other right-to-title legislation, has a definition of the practice of a "professional biologist." Some have interpreted this to mean that they have a "non-exclusive right to practice" although there has been no statement of policy from government on this, nor is there likely to be one.)
- ASTTBC's request to revisit a number of principles previously agreed to including, fundamentally, the definitions of technology and the scopes of practice of technologists and, especially, technicians.
- Concerted opposition to the merger by a group of APEGBC Past Presidents (self-named OPRA — Opposed to Proposed Rewrite of Act).

As of mid August 2004 integration activities were in temporary hiatus pending the outcome of efforts to resolve the concerns raised by ASTTBC and OPRA. The MITF Co-Chairs and the Executive Directors of APEGBC and ASTTBC were scheduled to meet in early September following which recommendations would be forwarded to their respective Councils on how best to proceed with this initiative.

Despite the difficulties encountered, the importance of resolving them is of national interest and impact. The elected leadership of both Associations supports achieving a win-win outcome to this initiative. Further reports to members will be available in *Innovation* and at the AGM.

This initiative has consumed significant human and financial resources. I especially thank President Bill Gilmartin PEng and Council for their continued support during a time of challenge, Anne Garrett PEng and her capable staff, the volunteers who served on this task force, the several guidelines subcommittees, and the new *Act* Committee as well as our legal counsel for their contributions this past year.

## **Sustainability Committee**

sustainability is the concept of utilizing our physical, natural and social resources to meet our needs and aspirations without compromising the wellbeing of future generations and the global ecosystem.

Michel de Spot PEng chaired the Sustainability Committee up to December 2003 and has continued as an active member and immediate Past Chair. In January

2004 I took on the role of Chair. Formerly reporting to the Professional Practice Committee, the Sustainability Committee now reports directly to Council while continuing to collaborate with other APEGBC committees such as Environment.

New members this year include Councillor Frank Denton PEng along with Catherine Brown PEng/PGeo, Christy Love EIT and William Gies MAIBC. Catherine contributes considerable experience in geotechnical engineering, Christy is a former APEGBC Sustainability Researcher, and William represents the Architectural Institute of BC's Energy and Environment Committee.

The Sustainability Committee revised and updated its terms of reference for approval by Council. Its purpose is to identify, promote and facilitate sustainability in the practice of engineering and geoscience. In this context, we developed the definition of sustainability that introduces this report.

With financial assistance from the National Research Council and Western Economic Diversification Canada, the Committee hired its third Sustainability Researcher, Anthea Jubb EIT, to support the Committee in implementing the Sustainability Management System.

Last year marked the first APEGBC Sustainability Award, presented to the Greater Vancouver Regional District (GVRD) for four projects within its Sustainable Region initiatives: the Little Mountain Reservoir reconstruction, Cloverdale sanitary sewer overflow, Brunette-Fraser greenway and SEE-Gen waste incinerator. Tim Jervis PEng, GVRD's Manager of Engineering and Construction, accepted the award on behalf of his team. This year we again received a number of strong nominations and the winner will be announced at APEGBC's 2004 Annual Conference in October.

The Sustainability Committee and the AIBC Energy and Environment Committee collaborated to host the second travelling sustainability exhibit titled Sustainability 2003-2004: Greening the Built Environment, which showcased innovative sustainable solutions to development by APEGBC members and other profes-

sionals. *Greening the Built Environment* made its debut at APEGBC's 2003 AGM and then toured Simon Fraser University Harbour Centre, Vancouver City Hall, Vancouver Public Library for Engineering Week and a number of conferences including Globe 2004.

The Sustainability Primer is now complete with the two final modules added this year. It contains modules on sustainability in mining, municipal engineering, buildings, transportation, consulting engineering and geoscience, industrial processes and climate change.

Four issues of the Committee's newsletter, *Sustainability Now*, were published this year and featured interviews with Tim Jervis PEng (last year's Sustainability Award winner), Ray Tarnai PEng of Sandwell Engineering (energy audits) and Linda Coady, Vice President, Pacific Region, World Wildlife Fund (industrial partnerships with environmental organizations).

The Committee continues to raise the profile of professional engineering and professional geoscience in BC. Over the year five publications ran articles mentioning APEGBC's sustainability initiative: Construction Business magazine, Property Management, Fresh Outlook, Design Quarterly and SCWIST News. Innovation also ran three stories on sustainability this year.

The Committee has represented APEGBC at the Western Economic Diversification Environmental Technology Forum and Roundtable, Buildex Convention, Pacific Energy Innovation Association Convention, Environmental Manager Association Convention and other events. The recently adopted Green Building Strategy for Southeast False Creek and the City of Vancouver also received our input and support.

Our website, www.sustainability.ca, continues to develop in content and popularity — reaching up to 800 sessions a day — and is well on its way to becoming a comprehensive database of information on sustainability.

## REGISTRATION

## **Contaminated Sites Roster Steering Committee**

he Roster Steering Committee (RSC), whose members are appointed by the Director of Waste Management for the BC Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection, was created to aid in the administration of the Contaminated Sites Roster of Professional Experts. Members are authorized under the Contaminated Sites Regulation to make recommendations to the Min-

istry's environmental managers concerning the issuance of Approvals in Principle, Certificates of Compliance and Contaminated Soil Relocation Agreements for low to moderate risk sites as well as determinations that a site is or is not contaminated.

During 2003/2004 the RSC held two general meetings with the full Roster membership and the public to report on and discuss operational issues as well as to seek input on the development of the proposed new Licensed Environmental Professional (LEP) system, whose ongoing work represents a major portion of the RSC's activities. The scope of this work, which is funded by the Ministry and will replace the current Roster system, necessitated the formation of the LEP Development Subcommittee as well as a stakeholder advisory group.

Since January 2004 several additional models of the LEP have been reviewed. In conjunction with these reviews the RSC and Subcommittee developed and conducted an online survey outlining the possible parameters of the new LEP system for BC; about 1,800 individuals were invited to participate. The survey responses were considered in the development of a report, Recommendation for an LEP System for Contaminated Sites in British Columbia, that was posted for public comment before being finalized and submitted to the Ministry.

An external consultant was contracted in June 2004 to develop the legal and operational framework of the LEP system based on the recommendations to the Ministry. After completion of the framework this fall, implementation of the new LEP system will begin with the goal of having it ready by spring 2005.

## **Registration Task Force**

he Registration Task Force was created to undertake a detailed review of issues that arise from, or require development for, our registration system.

Work on enhancing the EIT/GIT program continued. The aim is to create a program that will make the EIT/GIT period more effective in developing the professional and more significant in enhancing the start of his or her professional

career. The Task Force is incorporating the work done in other provinces and countries and APEGBC is participating in a national committee on EIT programs.

The main project this year was the investigation of structured industry EIT/GIT experience programs including individual company programs in BC, best practices in other jurisdictions and certification of com-

pany programs. A pilot project to develop a guideline for such programs was approved by Council in March.

The pilot project, which includes participation by the Canadian Council of Professional Engineers and the Hong Kong Institution of Engineers, is making use of background from current programs already operating in Hong Kong and the UK. A preliminary report was delivered to Council in September with submission of a final report to Council scheduled for February 2005.

Electronic reporting and reviewing of experience has become a full APEGBC program and is no longer dealt with by the Task Force. In early 2004 staff completed a total update of the program software and currently there are approximately 300 EIT/GITs participating.

Other ongoing items in the Task Force's work plan are as follows:

 Professional Practice Exam development is continuing and the first meeting of a national users group was held in July to develop a framework for revisions

to a truly national exam. A core of new questions has been developed and used for the BC exam and these will be integrated into a national exam.

- Still being considered are continuing professional development requirements for EIT/GITs, an item that has also been identified by the structured industry EIT/GIT program pilot.
- Development of a career planning program/manual for EIT/GITs.

## **Structural Qualifications Board**

he Structural Qualifications Board had another extremely busy year with its major work focused on the following:

 Reviewing the made-in-BC examination, as well as the oral examination, with candidates who have taken these examinations to determine whether improvements can be made. Generally, candidates felt that the examinations were thor-

ough and fair. We will continue these reviews on an annual basis.

- Meeting with municipal officials through their various professional groups to explain the program and receive their input. We will meet with these groups extensively during the next year.
- Meetings and discussions with BC Building Codes staff regarding incorporating the requirements for StructEng in the Building Code. This is to ensure consistency in application for building permits throughout the province.
- Continuing discussions with Washington State to ascertain equivalencies. The Structural Qualifications Board recently approved the use of Washington's Structural III exam as a qualification route for the StructEng designation [see July/August Innovation, page 10] and the exam will be offered for the first time on October 30, 2004 (application deadline is October 8, 2004).

Encouraging structural engineers to obtain their designation as soon as possible rather than waiting for the deadline of January 1, 2007. It should be noted that since the BC Codes and Practices examination is written only once a year, there are not many dates remaining and there is no plan to extend this deadline.

Currently, there are 17 StructEngs with eight through the IStructE route, five through the SE route and four through the oral route. In addition, 26 applications are in progress. We are anticipating a substantial increase in candidates as the deadline approaches.

The next BC Codes and Practices Examination will be held on November 12, 2004; the application deadline is October 8, 2004. Information can be found at www.apeg. bc.ca/reg/DesignatedStructuralEngineer.html.

Applications for the Oral Examination are accepted at any time, with the examination taking place at a time that is convenient to both the candidate and the examiners.

### **Act Rewrite Task Force**

he Engineers and Geoscientists Act was first written in 1920. Since that time it has undergone several revisions but it has remained fundamentally a 1920s Act. This Task Force was given a mandate by Council to review and rewrite the Act to make it more current and to better serve the needs of the public and our members.

The first draft of the *Act* was set aside when a referendum asked members if they were in favour of including the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians under our *Act*. The positive response enabled the Task Force to draft the *Engineering and Geoscience Professionals Act* for submission to the provincial government.

Throughout the past year, several drafts were prepared. In early 2004 the government drafters asked that we not make any further revisions until they prepared their draft for Association review. Shortly thereafter, we were advised that the draft would not be on the 2004 agenda for government approval and enactment. As a result, since it likely will not be on the government agenda again until 2006, Council has withdrawn the draft for further consideration.

The Task Force will remain in recess until Council has completed its deliberations on this matter and provides further instructions.

## **Building Envelope Committee**

he Building Envelope Committee was created to provide a forum for issues arising from the leaky condo problem, and the Building Envelope Professional qualification, that were not being dealt with in other venues and could benefit from broader discussion and deliberation. Issues considered over the past year include:

The relationship between

APEGBC and AIBC with respect to building envelope issues.

- The general health of the building envelope sector of the construction industry. That is, are we better off now than we were a few years ago when envelope failures were a hot public issue and APEGBC and AIBC were both actively responding?
- The status of problems now becoming apparent with highrise building envelopes.
- Provision of input to bodies who revise standards for materials used in the building envelope.
- The status of professional liability and contractor's insurance availability, and their effect on building envelope practice and protection of the public.
- Durability of construction and its relationship to green buildings.
- Dialogue with the City of Vancouver Building Depart-

- ment with a view to improving their processes for reviewing building envelope submissions.
- Preparation of a Guideline for Building Envelope Practice for APEGBC members.

In cooperation with APEGBC's CPD program, we hosted two 2-day continuing professional development sessions led by Dr John Straube of the University of Waterloo. These covered advanced building envelope theory and practice, and were very well received. We plan to repeat them as soon as possible.

I would like to thank all Committee members for their active participation and especially their efforts in serving on subcommittees that deal with various issues.

## **Consulting Practice Committee**



Chair

he Committee had a productive year as it concluded many items and continued work on many other issues that concern the practice and industry of consulting engineering and geoscience.

The Committee saw the conclusion of the Certificate of Authorization program. Specifically, an alternative to the Certificate of Authorization was created and is

provided for in the draft wording of the proposed new Act. This alternative encourages expansion of the scope of the practice review process to include a focus on the organization (company).

With some financial support by APEGBC through this Committee, the development of the Building Projects Practice Manual was completed. The Building Manual Project Committee released the final edition, which was endorsed by this Committee.

The Consulting Practice Committee worked with ASTTBC on a task force to develop a potential *Practice* Guideline for Registered Engineering Technologists Performing Structural Services for Building Projects. A draft guideline was developed and circulated for preliminary review, and attracted much concern and constructive comments from the structural engineering community. However, it has since been tabled pending the current suspension of the merger.

On behalf of this Committee, the Division of Structural Engineers is updating the current version of the Guidelines for Structural Engineering Services for Building Projects with the draft soon to be finalized. The Committee will subsequently begin to update existing guidelines for other disciplines.

## **Consulting Practice Committee CONTINUED**

The Committee has ongoing involvement in various other items of topical concern. Some are addressed directly while others are dealt with through representation with other groups. These items include the APEGBC/ASTTBC merger, Fee Schedule Guideline, Building Envelope Guideline, Structural Checking Guideline, Structural Qualifications Board (Designated Structural Engineer), Letters of Assurance, Civil Liability Review, Municipal Insurance Association Bylaw and Seismic Risk Task Force.

## **Discipline Committee**

tists Act provides for the establishment of Investigation and Discipline Committees to deal with complaints concerning the professional conduct of members of the Association and, when warranted, take disciplinary action. The current Act, Bylaws and Code of Ethics can be viewed at www.apeg.bc.ca.

This is one of the most important powers of our self-governing profession. Where the evidence indicates that there may have been a breach of the *Act*, Bylaws or Code of Ethics, the Investigation Committee must recommend to Discipline that an Inquiry Hearing be held.

The Discipline Committee continued to be active during the 12 months ending June 30, 2004, dealing with four new case files referred from Investigation for an Inquiry Hearing as well as six files from prior years. To date, five of these cases have been concluded. One was the result of an Inquiry Hearing where the charges were upheld and a penalty assessed against the member; in the other four the members accepted Stipulated Orders. The five cases remaining are in progress and are expected to be concluded by December 31, 2004.

The number of new cases has continued to be relatively stable over the past five years. An average of 127 complaints were received each year and, of these, an average of six cases were referred to Discipline in each of those years.

I wish to thank the members of the Committee who again have given their time freely to attend meetings

and serve on the Discipline Panels that hear Inquiries, and who continue to share their understanding and professional expertise in fulfilling the Association's disciplinary responsibilities. We lost a stalwart member of the Committee in the passing of Ole Simonsen PEng and we will miss his sage advice.

Harry McBride PEng will be retiring from APEGBC this fall. The Committee has relied heavily on Harry for his hard work, advice and counsel, and his departure will create a large void in our ranks. The Committee could not operate without the secretarial assistance given by Maria Seifert and we would like to acknowledge her work on our behalf.

## **Investigation Committee**

he Investigation Committee reviews complaints initially received and investigated by the Associate Director, Professional Ethics and determines whether there are reasonable and probable grounds to believe that the member under investigation has contravened the *Act*, Bylaws or Code of Ethics or has demonstrated incompetence, negligence or unprofessional conduct. If

there are reasonable and probable grounds, the Committee forwards its recommendation for an Inquiry to the Discipline Committee. If not, the Committee closes the file with no further action.

During the year there was an increase in the use of independent reviewers by the Committee for cases where a technical issue was beyond the expertise of Committee members. There was also an increase in the number of cases where the Committee specifically requested a legal opinion as to the weight of the evidence available in reaching a decision on the "reasonable and probable grounds" requirement. In addition, the division of the cases closed with no further action changed, with the Committee closing more of them than staff, as noted below.

As of June 30, 2004 a total of 108 complaint enquiries were received compared to 133 last year, and 71 of this year's files were closed without investigation as the complainants did not pursue their complaints. A further 10 files were reviewed and closed by staff with no further action; these file closures were later confirmed by the Committee.

Seven meetings were held this year and of the complaints considered by the Committee, four were forwarded to the Discipline Committee recommending that an Inquiry hearing be held and 23 were closed with no further action. Currently, 18 files are still under investigation. In all cases where the file was closed with no further action, the complainant and the member complained against were given written reasons for not proceeding to an inquiry.

I would like to thank resigning member Lianna Mah PEng for her efforts in supporting the objectives and responsibilities of the Association. Monica Danon-Schaffer PEng was appointed by Council to the Committee during this year. In addition, I thank the Association staff and all Committee members for their guidance, sincerity and commitment in ensuring fairness in the overall investigation process.

## **Practice Review Committee**

n the spring of 2003 the Practice Review program was put in abeyance due to a timing issue related to the passing of Bylaw 14(c). This bylaw authorized APEGBC to carry out practice reviews and was approved by the membership in October 1992.

In order to address the timing issue related to the passing of this bylaw, the Legislature passed the *Miscellaneous Statutes Amend-*

ment Act, SBC 2004, Chapter 23, Section 42, which retroactively corrected the timing issue. This allowed APEGBC to carry out practice reviews as per the above referenced Bylaw 14(c) and to reinitiate the Practice Review process.

The Practice Review Committee then met in June and July of 2004 and dealt with 58 files, appointing three new technical reviewers and one general reviewer. As a result, the Practice Review program is proceeding as usual.

To date, practice reviews have been carried out on 912 members with 79% in compliance, 17% requiring improvement and 4% referred to the Investigation

Committee. Over the last year, the Practice Review Committee completed a detailed review of the files adjudicated to date and will report on the general nature of their findings in an upcoming article in *Innovation*.

The Committee would like to thank APEGBC Council for addressing the required legislative amendment with the provincial government so that the practice review process could be reinitiated. In addition the provincial government, in recognizing the importance of the Practice Review program as a key regulatory tool to administer the professions of engineering and geoscience, is to be congratulated for their cooperation in implementing the necessary legislative changes.

## **Seismic Risk Task Force**



ollowing the demise of the BC
Ministry of Finance Seismic
Mitigation Program in March
2003, concern was expressed
regarding the safety of BC schools
in the event of an earthquake.

As Chair of the APEGBC Seismic Risk Task Force I became involved in this issue when I was contacted by Dr Tracy Monk, Chair of the Families for School Seismic Safety (FSSS). On behalf

of APEGBC I expressed interest in being involved in working with the provincial and federal levels of government as well as FSSS so that a strategy could be developed to address the problem.

In September 2003 I attended a meeting between FSSS and Premier Gordon Campbell on this matter. As a result of this meeting and further discussions and correspondence, the Ministry of Education (MoE) requested that APEGBC submit a preliminary proposal regarding the development of a standardized risk assessment tool to assess the seismic risk of school buildings. I also met with representatives of Western Economic Diversification Canada, which also indicated their interest in providing funding.

As a result of the above activity, in January 2004 APEGBC Council established the Seismic Risk Assessment Steering Committee that included representatives from APEGBC and the Consulting Engineers of BC (CEBC).

In February 2004 the MoE identified three specific areas in which APEGBC could provide valuable advice and assistance:

- APEGBC helped the MoE to establish a working group of experts in the field to refine the approach used under the Ministry of Finance's Seismic Mitigation Program to carry out seismic assessments of school buildings.
- 2. APEGBC submitted a detailed proposal to the MoE for the development of guidelines to be used by professional engineers when conducting seismic risk assessments on school buildings using a performance-based methodology. APEGBC arranged for the UBC Civil Engineering Department, under the supervision of Dr Carlos Ventura PEng, to develop a software-based format for ease of application of the performance-based methodology. A team of professional engineers with extensive expertise in the seismic assessment of school buildings was used to peer review the development of the guidelines using performance-based methodology.

 APEGBC Council provided two APEGBC nominees to the MoE's Schools Seismic Program Steering Committee. The group was charged with overseeing and implementing the work to be carried out in 2004 regarding the seismic assessment of school buildings in BC.

In response to the proposal identified in item 2) above, in June 2004 the MoE awarded to APEGBC a \$185,000 contract for the following:

- Organize and implement a training workshop for professional engineers interested in conducting seismic risk assessments of school buildings. APEGBC worked with the MoE to establish minimum training and experience qualifications for engineers who want to be placed on an MoE database of individuals who provide these services.
- Develop a Canadian version of ATC-21, a rapid screening seismic risk assessment tool developed in the US.
- Develop guidelines for professional engineers who conduct seismic risk assessments on school buildings using a performance-based methodology in a software-based format.

APEGBC completed the training session aspect of the contract in June, the Canadian version of ATC-21 in July and will complete the development of the guidelines by October. Dr Ventura and the Peer Review Committee have been instrumental in keeping the project on track.

Finally, in April 2004, APEGBC signed a \$150,000 contract with Western Economic Diversification Canada to develop guidelines for conducting seismic risk assessments on midrise to highrise buildings, again using a performance-based methodology in a software-based format. This contract will also be completed in the fall of 2004.

Our involvement with the aforementioned agencies on these types of projects enhances the perception of the public and the government that APEGBC can take a lead role in working with government to implement appropriate processes to address public safety issues involving the professions of engineering and geoscience.

## **ABCFP/APEGBC Joint Practice Board**

he Joint Practice Board was created in 1994 by APEGBC and the Association of BC Professional Foresters (recently renamed the Association of BC Forest Professionals, or ABCFP) to address issues concerning the scope and practice of forestry, engineering and geoscience in the development, management and administration of BC's forest resources.

The Board focused most of its attention over the past year on administrative matters related to the change in legislation from the Forest Practices Code to the Forest and Range Practices Act. Issues of particular concern were changing needs for the skill sets developed under the Forest Practices Code that were now required to relate to results-based professional reliance.

The Board meets monthly except July and August. In December 2003 we set out a work plan for 2004 that included reviewing and redrafting the former skills sets for stream crossings, forest road design and terrain stability into guideline documents that professionals in both associations could refer to, particularly in areas with an overlap of practice.

The stream crossing issue evolved into the development of *Guidelines for Professional Services in the Forest Sector — Bridges and Major Culverts.* This area of joint practice is of concern to the Board as it has significant safety implications. An initial draft of the guidelines was circulated to practitioner members of both associations for review, with comments received from ABCFP members in late 2003 and the Division of Engineers and Geoscientists in the Forest Sector (DEGIFS) in early 2004.

A consolidated version was then presented to the two Associations in June of this year; further comments

were received and are currently under review. The Board intends have the final guidelines approved by the two Associations and available for distribution by the fall.

The Board also intends to review the *Guidelines* for *Terrain Stability Assessments in the Forest Sector* that were developed by DEGIFS and published by APEGBC in 2003. This is another area of joint practice requiring a common set of guidelines endorsed by the two Associations.

The Board continues to monitor implementation of the *Forest and Range Practices Act* as this *Act* shifts additional responsibility onto the professional forester for forest management. The Board believes it has a responsibility to be aware of any new areas of joint practice and to provide support and guidance to professionals as new issues arise, as well as to receive and consider related concerns from the two Associations.

The Board expresses its appreciation to Dwight Yochim of ABCFP and Peter Mitchell PEng of APEGBC for their dedication and tireless efforts, which are critical to our efficient functioning. Our role has never been more important in these changing times and we will continue to address new challenges. As a result of the volunteer efforts of their members, the relationship between the two Associations will be further strengthened.

### **Career Awareness Committee**

he Career Awareness Committee continues to work with Association staff and volunteers to increase awareness of engineering and geoscience careers as well as options among elementary, secondary and university students in BC. Efforts include support for career presentations and MathCounts as well as Industry Nights for UBC, SFU and UVic engineering and

geoscience undergrads as part of APEGBC's Member Advantage Program for Students (MAPS).

This year we initiated meetings with BC school districts to create a new APEGBC career outreach program to encourage students to pursue careers in engineering or geoscience while meeting the criteria established by the Ministry of Education's new Planning 10 and Portfolio Choice programs. These new programs are designed to help students determine how their areas of study, such as applied science, can develop into careers. APEGBC's program will likely comprise a CD-Rom presentation with supporting materials that volunteers can use as part of classroom visits.

Committee members and APEGBC staff met with representatives from School Districts 44 and 45, and more recently the Lower Mainland Steering Committee for Career Programs, to gain a better understanding of the desired outcomes of these programs and the most suitable structure of a complementary APEGBC program. Committee members and staff will review existing career awareness programs and reference materials to determine the best format and content of a new APEGBC high school outreach program.

MathCounts and APEGBC continued their strong collaboration this past year. The 2004 regional and

provincial competitions took place in February and March and numerous professional engineers and geoscientists answered the call for volunteers. MathCounts and APEGBC are working with the US parent organization to find ways to continue this popular program for BC students despite a proposed increase in licensing fees. John Morgan PEng deserves special recognition for his efforts as Chair of MathCounts over the past two years and his dedicated contributions to this program.

Shelley Lebar, Student Member Coordinator, is the Association's liaison with university student executives and clubs, managing our on-campus Industry Nights and other related undergraduate programs. The Industry Nights are a great success with students and contribute to bridging the gap between universities, industry and APEGBC. A particular note of thanks to the many APEGBC volunteers who help out and to our corporate sponsors who make a generous financial contribution to support the students.

This year's Committee should be pleased with their efforts as a number of key issues were addressed in the promotion of engineering and geoscience. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Committee, volunteers and staff who participated in 2003/2004 activities.

## **Continuing Professional Development Committee**

PD Committee members and staff had an active year. Major efforts focused on increasing members' CPD awareness, providing learning opportunities through APEGBC-organized seminars, improving professional development resources for members such as the CPD Online Reporting Centre, and developing requirements for a compulsory CPD program that will meet the

needs of both members and the public.

A survey was conducted last summer to obtain member input on mandatory CPD issues. Survey results indicated that many members are in favour of such an initiative but need more information before finalizing a program. The CPD Committee has drafted program details and requirements and will seek additional member input on the process later this year.

Numerous aspects of a mandatory CPD program are being investigated including reviewing the experiences of other associations that have implemented similar programs, researching the requirements of APEGBC members, creating information avenues for members, reviewing the legislative mechanism for implementation, classifying the categories for documenting members' CPD efforts, determining a minimum number of required annual CPD hours, and monitoring.

During the past year, 80 CPD seminars were organized by staff and volunteers at various locations throughout

BC. In addition to the Lower Mainland offerings, seminar locations included Victoria, Kelowna, Prince George, Trail, Nelson, Nanaimo, Abbotsford and Kamloops. Seminar topics included technical, regulatory, managerial, business and personal skills. Three seminars were offered on the web, with good success, to participants from across Canada and the USA. We look forward to conducting more in 2004/2005.

The number of members using APEGBC's Online CPD Recording Centre has increased to 330. However, this number is still quite low and we encourage all members who have not used this resource to give it a try. ## **Member Services Committee**

PEGBC represents more than 22,000 potential direct buyers and their families: that's a lot of group purchasing power. The Member Services Committee evaluates affinity program participants for inclusion in a growing list of member service and product providers, resulting in benefits members cannot normally receive on their own.

The Committee is directed by its terms of reference to facilitate the delivery of value-

added member service programs and to generate alternative revenue streams while respecting the Association's fundamental regulatory responsibility to the public.

The Committee was originally formed as the Home Insurance Committee to negotiate and monitor the first APEGBC-sponsored insurance affinity program with Park Insurance. As the home insurance program expanded to offer auto and other insurance coverage, the Committee's mandate was expanded five years ago at the suggestion of long-time chair Colin Wright PEng and was renamed the Member Services Committee.

Over the past 15 years the Member Insurance Program with Park Insurance has grown to include over 6,000 active policies. Park's customer satisfaction survey results show that over 90% of policy holders rate their claim experience as good or excellent, and over 95% would recommend the program to a friend or a

colleague. There was only one formally registered complaint in the last five years.

Some years ago the Committee negotiated an administration fee paid by the underwriter, Lombard Insurance, to the Association based on the program's annual loss ratio results. This has delivered \$265,412 in revenues to APEGBC over the past five years. As a result, the net positive cash flow to the Association enables it to concentrate on its regulatory programs and services at lower costs to the membership.

Total revenue generated this fiscal year by all APEGBC affinity programs including fees, donations to the APEGBC Foundation, affinity provider advertising in *Innovation* and affinity provider participation as exhibitors and sponsors at the Annual Conference was \$180,772. Individual member savings generated from the favourable rates of our affinity programs are conservatively estimated to cover or exceed the annual membership fee.

Member response to affinity program updates has generally been positive, generating good suggestions for possible programs such as transit passes, travel insurance and various products. The Committee is eager to investigate new areas recommended by members. he Mentoring Committee helps EITs and GITs obtain professional registration in the four-year time frame by matching trainees with experienced registered professionals, who guide trainees as they gain work experience and develop their skills.

An excellent evening seminar on applying coaching skills in a mentoring environment, led by Cheryl Smith, was held in Novem-

ber. The session involved direct teaching, stimulating discussion and practice sessions. The trainer, Committee members, mentors and trainees all learned something valuable to apply in their own mentoring experiences.

We recently surveyed members-in-training who participate in the program to ensure that it is meeting their needs. We are working on operational improvements to facilitate the Committee's work in matching and tracking contacts with mentors and trainees. In the coming year, we will continue with matching activities and plan to hold another seminar in November 2004.

Each year the Committee receives applications from internationally trained engineers and geoscientists who seek professional registration but are not registered as EITs/GITs. As the program's mandate is to assist members-in-training to navigate the traditional four-year experience requirement, these applicants were outside the purview of the program. However, the Committee will seek Council's approval to expand its terms of reference to include mentoring for internationally trained engineers

who become Provisional Members with the Association. We will continue to advertise to both recent graduates and potential mentors.

Ongoing support from the Association has been readily available and the Committee has a close working relationship with Association staff members Sandra Lee and Janet Sinclair.

This past year Al Bolger PEng resigned from the Mentoring Committee; his support is missed but we wish him well in his new work. Committee members Mike MacLatchy PEng, James Canova PEng and Martin Paul PEng are in the Vancouver area; Barry Brooks PEng provides mentoring support in the Victoria Branch and assists in making suitable matches on Vancouver Island. he Public Relations Committee works with a strong commitment to make the public aware that APEGBC professionals:

Through our activities the Committee continues to strengthen the competitive advantage of all APEGBC professionals.

Budget constraints this past year prevented the Committee from developing a new advertising campaign. However, a new ad in the "imagine a world without ..." campaign was created in the fall and we recirculated previously developed ads throughout the year in *Innovation* and other external publications such as *Business in Vancouver*, *BC Business* and the *Kelowna Daily Courier*.

The Committee met infrequently over the past year with decreased activities because of uncertainty in direction from the Communications Committee, to which our Committee reports. Discussions at this level included whether the Public Relations Committee should be discontinued, amalgamated with other subcommittees or redefined with alternate objectives. Until these decisions were clarified, our Committee was uncertain as to its continued existence or whether it would be restructured in form and capacity. The Communications Committee continues to review their subcommittees to rationalize their operations and objectives in light of the new direction by APEGBC Council to move towards a policy governance model.

Despite these uncertainties, the Public Relations Committee met internally and discussed its value to the Association and whether it should continue to function. We concluded that the various advertising campaigns produced by this group generated great value for APEGBC members as these ads are effective in promoting the value that professional engineers and professional geoscientists bring to employers, businesses and the general

public. This success re-energized the Committee's determination to continue to reinforce our message and to get the word out about the value professional engineers and professional geoscientists generate for society.

The Committee will also continue to look at innovative ways to raise funds to continue our work. We will seek perennial and sustainable business partnerships with business groups and companies that see value in promoting their company through association with APEGBC.

However, the Committee also agreed that perhaps new methods should be tried and that the time may be right to add to our media mix to achieve these objectives. For instance, a local radio station approached the Association with the concept of airing a professional engineering and geoscience ad. To leverage the costs of such ads and run them more frequently, the Committee will look for cosponsorships with other engineering and geoscience firms and individuals.

Although the Public Relations Committee was not as active as I would have liked over the past year, and despite working with budgets that seem to be more challenging year after year, we remain resolved to continue to work on behalf of the membership to reinforce the competitive advantage of professional engineers and geoscientists. Under these financial restraints it may take longer to achieve our goals, but we will eventually get there.

We welcome feedback from members. Please let us know if we are on the right track and take an active role in voicing your opinions to Council and the Communications Committee as to the worth of having a Public Relations Committee to promote professional engineering and professional geoscience.

# Division for Advancement of Women in Engineering and Geoscience (DAWEG)



nother exciting year for DAWEG is coming to a close with our AGM on September 25. Throughout the year, we continued to implement our annual programs to enhance the participation of women at all levels in the engineering and geoscience professions. We also started a number of new initiatives to be carried forward to 2004/2005 and beyond.

Our programs provide opportunities for networking, mentoring, skills development, outreach, collaboration with other organizations and providing support to APEGBC's female members.

Activities over the past year include our annual salary seminar, where 80 up-and-coming female and male professionals developed their salary negotiation skills. Our annual Fun Run, the main fundraiser for DAWEG's programs, saw 50 runners and walkers celebrate the start of National Engineering Week. Good attendance is anticipated at the DAWEG-sponsored professional development stream at the APEGBC Annual Conference.

In addition to our regular quarterly newsletters and semi-annual member socials, our new networking and member outreach programs include monthly informal coffee talk meetings and biweekly TGIF emails. We are also investigating restarting a Victoria Chapter.

Our outreach efforts have brought 25 new members to DAWEG this year including a large number of new Executive members. As part of the rejuvenation process we held a strategy and teambuilding session for our Executive followed by a dragon boat paddle in False Creek, and updated our Strategic Plan and Policy.

With DAWEG's support, the UBC Tri-Mentoring Program successfully completed its pilot that brought together 30 female students and 15 female mentors from industry and academia; the program is recruiting approximately 150 new participants for the coming year. In our efforts to make APEGBC activities more family-friendly, we offer childcare during all DAWEG events.

DAWEG's collaborative efforts gave several of our members the opportunity to participate in a CCWEST national consultation as part of an initiative to increase advocacy and influence on policymakers in government, industry, academia and other organizations to strengthen the participation of women in science, engineering, trades and technology.

Our continued collaboration with the MIT Women's Initiative brought a group of MIT female engineering students to 11 high schools in the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island. In collaboration with APEGBC, DAWEG's sponsorship program enables women to attend conferences such as those of CCWEST and NCWIE.

# Division of Engineers and Geoscientists in the Forest Sector (DEGIFS)



he 2003/2004 term began with another highly successful AGM in Penticton.

DEGIFS hosted an exciting field trip exploring the geology of the southern Okanagan followed by two days of presentations. The first day focused on landslide hazards and risks case studies and was a preview of the recently published Land Management Handbook 56 — Landslide Risk Case

Studies in Forest Development Planning and Operations. The second day featured a wide variety of topics including snow avalanches, hydrogeomorphology and professional practices under the Forest and Range Practices Act. Other DEGIFS initiatives include:

- awarding two bursaries of \$1,000 each to students in programs related to forest engineering, geoscience or geotechnique;
- reviewing and providing input to the Joint Practice Board's draft Guidelines for Professional Services in the Forest Sector — Bridges and Major Culverts;
- working with the CEBC and the Ministry of Forests to improve professional services contracting practices;
- providing input to the previously noted Landslide Risk Case Studies document via members on the Risk Task Force; and
- initiating discussions on the roles and responsibilities of forest engineers in BC.

The DEGIFS Aspect newsletter editors and webmaster continue to work diligently to keep our members informed and entertained. For those who are not DEGIFS members but are interested in work in which DEGIFS members are involved, past issues of Aspect are available at www.degifs.com/resources.php3?category=aspectnewsletter.

As most members are aware, the *Guidelines for Ter*rain Stability Assessments in the Forest Sector was published by APEBGC in October 2003. In January and February 2004 APEGBC and DEGIFS members presented the guidelines at professional development workshops in Richmond and Kelowna.

DEGIFS members will not want to miss the October 2004 AGM in Whistler where we will feature another two days of presentations including talks on forest roads and bridges, road construction practices, forest fires and, of course, landslides. A field trip is also planned to explore the influence of logging operations on the stability of fans.

The BC forest industry continues to evolve in response to increased knowledge of the dynamics of forest land, changes to socioeconomic values, and shifts in the regulatory framework. As a result, DEGIFS continues to play an important role in monitoring professional engineering and geoscience practice, promoting education and high standards of practice, and responding to issues of public interest in the forest.

I wish to thank the Executive, the *Aspect* editorial team, subcommittee members and all others who have assisted DEGIFS by volunteering time or passing along comments or observations pertinent to the DEGIFS membership. As in past years, DEGIFS relied heavily on Peter Mitchell PEng, our APEGBC liaison. Thanks also to all those members who agreed to be nominated for the 2004/2005 Executive. Your desire to be involved is what makes DEGIFS so successful.

he Municipal Engineers

The MED provides a forum for

our members to continue their professional development. This is accomplished by our Executive members organizing regular technical seminars on municipal engineering and local government issues, publishing regular newsletters on relevant issues and current events, and developing common standards and specifications.

This year, Dave Dean PEng and Alan Newcombe PEng left the municipal sector to join the consulting engineering sector. We thank both for their excellent work while serving on the Executive and their commitment to the municipal engineering profession. We are extremely pleased to have retained the services of John Bremner PEng to carry out this work for us. Through extensive research on existing engineering consultant selection processes, criteria and guidelines in both the public and private sectors; and a consultation process with a representative sample of municipal engineers, the Consulting Engineers of BC and other potential stakeholders, the final product will be standardized yet flexible and adaptable for municipal engineers to use for their specified purpose.

On behalf of the MED Executive I want to encourage all municipal engineers to join the Division and take advantage of the opportunities to network and learn more about municipal engineering in BC.
